
Getting Started In Genealogical Research

An Important Genealogical Concept

Work Backwards

from the

Known to the Unknown

Golden Rule for Research

Never assume.

Always check for the facts.

Try to double-check or confirm "facts" with legal documents.

Why?

Remember, your ultimate aim is to record your family history for posterity.

1. Write down everything YOU know about the person or family you are researching.



Ask yourself:

Who am I?

- When was I born?
- Where was I born?



To whom am/was I married?

- When?
- Where?

Now Begin to Work Backwards Ask yourself:

Who are my parents?

- When and where were they born?
- When and where were they married?
- What was my mother's maiden name?
- Are they deceased?
 - When, where and how did they die?
 - Where are their graves?

Who are my Who are my mother's

Record everything you know about all of the people, including:

Middle names

Nicknames (or most commonly used names)

Every place you know of where they lived, and the dates

What they did for a living

Their religion(s) and where they worshipped

Hobbies

Any family stories you can remember

Interview Relatives

Now ask the same questions to all your living relatives: parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, etc.



2. Locate family documents (including the Family Bible).



Locate important family documents

Photograph, photocopy, scan or hand copy everything you find

Note where and when you found each item

If you find a family Bible, check it for entries of major events (births, marriages, deaths)

 Trust the accuracy of the entries more if they were written in more than one hand or colour of ink, because this suggests that the entries were written as each event occurred.


3. Begin your outside research. See if you can find a guide to researching in your area of interest.



4. Work backward in time from the known to the unknown.




5. Check birth, marriage and death records.






6. Check for church or parish records as a primary source of information.


7. Check census or assessment records if they are available.




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


McClelan Cathaline F Daughter S Dec 1899



The internet is a useful tool:

- as a networking tool to communicate with other researchers and genealogical organizations

"Facts" on the Internet need to be checked for accuracy.



- non-English alphabets, if necessary
- record census and other facts
- money back guarantee

- •Males can test their Y-DNA to get their father's male line.
- •Males can test their mtDNA to obtain their mother's female line.
- Females can test their mtDNA to get their mother's all female line.
- •Females and males can test their atDNA and match any cousin related to them on the lineages between the allmale and all-female line for at least six generations.
- •Females and males can test X-DNA to find out more information about your ancestry.



Braddish BILLINGS, a son of Dr Elkanah BILLINGS was one of the first settlers in what is now the capital of Canada. Braddish's house was left to the city by one of his descendants and has become the Billings Estate Museum. There is considerable interest in the genealogy of the BILLINGS family by visitors to the City Archives and this is an attempt to compile a reference chart of the family. It initially concentrated on the descendants of Dr Elkanah but an article in the The New England Historical and Genealogical Register, 'Roger Billings of Milton, Mass., and some of his descendants, by Harold Ward Dana published 1938-1940, lead to an expansion to include the known descendants of immigrant Roger Billings. This has not yet been completed but it is now time to make the information available on line. I would appreciate any corrections or additions, which will then lead to a revised version.

This project has not yet been completed but it is time to make the information available on line. It has been compiled from a variety of sources but not all has been verified. Most of these sources are derivative and researchers should check the originals whenever possible. I will post updates as I progress and the date will be included in the main title. Please contact me if you have any corrections or updates.


